Being the affiliated college of a University, the institution has hardly any scope of curriculum development. However, the BOS members directly and other teachers indirectly do contribute in curriculum development.

Building up of infrastructure, appointment of more teachers, purchase of books, encouraging teachers to attend seminars and workshops, submit major/minor research projects, acquiring higher degrees.

Conducted by the affiliating University and some reforms have been initiated internally. Class Test, Surprise Test and Unit Test are taken regularly.

6.3.4 Research and Development

The college encourages the faculty members to attend seminars and workshops, submit major/minor research projects, acquiring higher degrees. Majority of the teachers are involved regularly in research and seminar/conferences.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

The college regularly purchases book, computers, instruments for physical education and science labs for the benefit of the students. The college also subscribed the BSNL Broadband connection with wifi facility along with VPNN connection.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

As per the guidance of the Governing Body of the college, the Principal has the responsibility of Human Resource Management. The existing State Govt. and UGC norms are followed in this respect.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

The college authority made regular requisition to the Government for the appointment of permanent teachers. To solve the immediate problem of shortage of teachers and staff the college recruits Guest Lecturers and staff on purely temporary basis. Permanent faculty is recruited centrally by the West Bengal College Service Commission and permanent non-teaching staff is recruited by the College Governing Body.
